REPORTS

BULIMBA CREEK PADDLE DAY 25th MARCH

Despite a week of rain and a forecast of a possible shower, 12 paddlers in 10 craft arrived at the Meadowlands Road, Carina launch site.

Boats were soon launched and the fleet set off in slack water to catch the ebb for the 11.5km paddle down the creek to the Fleming Road, Hemmant boat ramp. The water was rather dirty as the result of the rains and the plan was to have as little contact with it as possible. Great caution and teamwork had been the plan in boarding at the pontoon as the cut out section is too narrow and too short. (Particularly for the host's fat PLASTIC (???) sit-on-top kayak)

The paddling was easy with the tidal assistance and the scenery attractive and always changing. The upper reaches are quite narrow and with the recent rains, a number of snags due to trees in the water had to be negotiated. This added to the adventure.

Martin Kortlucke had invited two Mens' Shed friends, Mike and Greg and they seemed to enjoy the day enormously. Martin had begun to struggle a little and was soon under tow from Darrell Spiers' canoe with its electric outboard. Or perhaps Darrell had encouraged Martin to take the tow so he could stop paddling?

The narrow upper reaches contain sections of rainforest trees including many palms. This is followed by more woodland type of vegetation with she-oaks and gums. This is finally replaced by mainly mangroves.

A number of bridges are paddled under and the tide at those became stronger and a little more interesting. Surprisingly the call of a whip bird was heard among the calls of a number of birds. Peter Fox was joined by his lovely daughter Peta Anne for the paddle in the Eureka canoe he had built with the assistance of his father at a workshop run by WBAQ member Mat at the Pelican slipway. Other paddlers included the host's wife Robbie, the other lans -Primrose and Trail, Steve Ainscough and John Morrison who carried out the task of 'rear-end-Charlie 'perfectly.

With their assistance all the craft were soon out of the water and the offer of a lift back to the launch spot for the drivers greatly appreciated. This meant that the maxi taxi hire was not required.

Many of the participants returned to the park at Meadowland Road for lunch and a yarn.

The chat among the paddlers seemed to confirm that the event was enjoyable with a new location being popular. This point-to-point style of paddle has the advantage of seeing new scenery for the entire length, with the car shuffle not being that difficult to arrange. So a big thanks to those members involved. NAUTICAL TERMS IN CURRENT USE

Chock-a-Block -

If two blocks of rigging tackle were so hard together they couldn't be tightened further, it was said they were "Chock-a-Block".

Today, it simply means "really full" – The phrase *Chock-a-Block* has a nice rhythm to it (alliteration)- we should use it more often.

TIMBER FOR BOAT BUILDING 1. TASMANIAN OAK Ian Primrose

In this section, over the rest of the year, we will look at different timbers that are useful for boat-building. Thanks to Ron, who provided a source for some of this information.

1.Tasmanian Oak (Eucalyptus delegaensis, regnans and obliqua)

For a start, this timber is not an "oak".

The collective name refers to members of the ash group of eucalyptus, which are amongst the tallest hardwoods in the world. Together, the three types compose of one of the cheapest and most plentiful of Tasmanian timbers. Because of the long ribbons and strips of bark shed from the upper trunk, often conspicuously draping the branches, in popular parlance, they are frequently called "stringybarks".

They are also found on the Australian mainland and some other eucalypt species are sometimes sold under the same name. The grain is usually straight, open, and even with a straw colour sometimes tending to light reddish brown. Possessing good strength, resilience and bending characteristics, it is relatively easy to work and takes paint and stain well. Durability varies among the species, *Renans* being the most durable. **The average density is 700kg/M3.**

Tasmanian oak is sold by Bunnings (as well as other suppliers) in the form of dressed-all-round (DAR) and mouldings.


THE 237 YEAR OLD TYPO MORETON BAY Ian Primrose

In May 1770, Capt, James Cook, sailing north from Botany Bay, named "Point Lookout" on what later became North Stradbroke Island. The waters behind were also named by Cook...

"On the North side of this point the shore forms a wide open bay, which I have named Morton's Bay, in the Bottom of which the land is so low that I could but just see it from the Topmast head..."

The naming came in recognition of James Douglas, 14th Earl of Morton, a Scottish astronomer who became President of the Royal Society in 1764. The Earl actually died shortly after Cook's departure in 1768.

Due to a spelling error in the account of Cook's voyage, the name became "Moreton Bay". The error also applied to the next promontory that he passed, which he named "Cape Morton".





So, from the days well before spell-checkers and good editing, we are stuck with that typo today!

Queensland Transport is paying attention to trailer hitch loads and adequacy of mudguards. Know the allowable trailer hitch load of your vehicle and ensure it is not exceeded. Trailers should have mudguards to protect the area above 30 degrees from the contact of wheel to road. Timber trailers are permitted by must be fit for purpose, i.e. adequately designed.

Epoxy, use the same brand of resin and hardener, measure accurately and mix well.

Materials to construct a steam box: PVC piping (sewerage quality, not stormwater), metal downpipe wrapped in lagging, plywood.
