However, young peoples' interest in activities such as sailing – or lack of it makes me ponder about the future of clubs and organizations. Surf Lifesaving Aust have problems retaining kids beyond Nippers; The town of Yamba cannot field two football teams due to lack of numbers; Scouting is dwindling and sailing clubs report a loss of membership beyond junior ranks. Ok, some kids do play organized sport.

Does this mean that kids these days are not interested in outdoor activities and are now engaged only in screen-based entertainment? Part of the problem it would seem, is that the parents of these kids are unable to support the clubs and organizations that run the activities for their kids and therefore do not encourage their kids into them. Everyone is "time-poor" as they say.

In "our day" (at the risk of showing age) it was nearly every kid's dream of owning a boat or canoe. These desirable items could not be obtained off-the-shelf — you had to make them, usually with the help of your father. Today we are spoilt for choice with a huge range of mass-produced plastic boats available relatively cheaply due to affluence. You don't need to be in a club to use them.

Many of the kids who grew up in the 1950s and 60s are now our members and are grandparents. There are plenty of examples where our members encourage and expose their grandkids to boating and even boat-building. Good on you! Whilst we might be going against the overall trend, we do make a small difference to a few lucky kids who will go through life with good boating memories. Keep up the good work!

Nautical terms in common use

Groggy / Grog -

In 1740, British Admiral Vernon (whose nickname was "Old Grogram" for the cloak of grogram* that he wore) ordered that the sailors' daily ration of rum be diluted with water. The men called the mixture "grog". Hence a sailor who drank too much grog was "groggy". Today, "grog" has a broader meaning to cover most forms of (rougher-type) alcoholic beverages (but you knew that!)

*Grogram-a coarse fabric of silk, of silk and mohair or wool, or of wool, sometimes stiffened with gum, formerly used for clothing.

Derived from French gros grain meaning coarse grain.

A month after the Wooden Boat Festival, they hold **Steamfest** in Sheffield in the north of Tasmania. Only one steamboat (on a trailer) but a lot of big boys' toys! 13 min



CELERY TOP PINE (Phyllocladus asplenifolius)

Restricted to Tasmania, celery-top is highly durable making it one of the best boat building timbers available. Although technically a softwood, it has properties consistent with hardwoods. Its resilience, low shrinkage, good bending and working qualitiesplus it takes stains, varnishes explains its suitability. Its colour varies from white to straw, reddening slightly

with age, and it has conspicuous growth rings.
Supplies are limited. **Density is around 645kg/M3.**

KING WILLIAM PINE (Athrotaxis selanginoides)

Known as King Billy Pine. This native of Tasmania, is an easy timber to work, bend and finish, although inclined to chip then turning. It takes paint and varnish well but stains may not produce good results. The fine and even grain glues well and although the wood is a little soft for some applications, it is very durable. Its overall merit and relatively light weight at an average density of about 410 kg/M3, has favoured its use in boat building and aircraft as well as patternmaking, veneers and beehives. Its colour is a pale red when cut, fading to a pale yellowish pink on exposure to sunlight.

Safety chains on Trailers

Trailers without breakaway brakes, must be fitted with safety chains that are marked in accordance with the relevant Australian Standard complying with the following:

- ➤ Trailers that do not exceed 2500 kg ATM must have at least one safety chain complying with Australian Standard AS 4177.4-1994 or Australian Standard AS 4177.4-2004 'Caravan and light trailer towing components Part 4: Safety chains up to 3500kg capacity', or be a safety cable with a certified load capacity of the same
- ➤ Trailers over 2.5 tonnes and not exceeding 3.5 tonnes ATM must have two safety chains of designation of 3500 kg complying with Australian Standard AS 4177.4-1994 or Australian Standard AS 4177.42004
- Trailers over 3500 kg ATM must have two safety chains made from steel of a minimum 800 MPa breaking stress that conforms to the mechanical properties of Grade T chain as specified in <u>Australian Standard AS 2321-1979</u> 'Short Link Chain for Lifting Purposes (uncalibrated)' or <u>Australian Standard AS 2321-2006</u> 'Short Link Chain for Lifting Purposes.' Each chain must be sized such that the minimum breaking load exceeds the ATM.

The length of the safety chain/s must prevent the trailer's drawbar hitting the ground if the trailer is



detached from the towing vehicle. The safety chains must be properly connected to the tow bar with attachments capable of withstanding the specified breaking load of each chain. Do not use padlocks. For further information regarding couplings, brake requirements and safety chains please refer to the Vehicle Standard Bulletin - Building Small Trailers (VSB1) available on the Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development website (www.infrastructure.gov.au)

Safety Chain- Connections to Tow Bar

Safety chain(s) must be suitably and appropriately connected to a tow bar. The use of a shackle is permitted, provided the shackle used is fit for the purpose and compatible with the safety chain in terms of strength and size.

It is the responsibility of the vehicle owner/operator to ensure that a shackle, if used to attach safety chain to tow bar, is fit for the purpose and compatible with the safety chain. This can be demonstrated in a couple of ways:

 Use of a shackle that is compatible with the safety chain AND complies with AS 2741-2002 "Shackles". In this case the shackle will have appropriate markings.

Table-1 Selection of D Shackle (Guide only) SEE PAGE BELOW FOR THIS TABLE

 Alternatively, the use of a shackle that is compatible with the safety chain AND is of a reputable brand. In this case, the shackle will have appropriate markings to show the brand and/or part identification sufficient to trace its brand and strength.

It should be recognised that a shackle that does not have any markings makes it difficult to establish its strength or compatibility with the safety chain. It is the responsibility of the vehicle owner/operator to satisfactorily address inquiries raised during any roadside audit by an enforcement officer.

Notes:

- Usually diameter of the shackle pin is larger than the shackle body.
- The strength of a shackle will vary according to its grade. An "S" grade shackle will be stronger than an "M" grade shackle of the same size.
- Stainless steel shackles are generally unsuitable for trailer use due to the material's general low resistance to bending stresses.
- A Bow shackle will provide flexibility for greater angular movement compared to a "D" shackle.

WHAT HAPPENNED AT THE LAST MEETING

Andrew Rohan from **Norglass** gave us a very interesting talk on timber finishing using both paint and clear products. A lot of information – too much to fully describe here but main points are:

➤ The more solids in a paint the better. Get the product Data Sheet (not the MSDS or SDS) – look for about 60% solid content

Marine paint has ground fine solid pigments- house paint does not.

➤ Stir the can thoroughly – simple advice but often overlooked

➤ Read the directions – same as above

>Don't over-work the paint or you will get brush marks >Use 100mm mohair roller and tip off with quality brush. Paint one M2 move away 1 metre and work back to wet edge. Work quickly.

➤ Sand with 240 between coats

➤ If you get runs then you are putting the paint on too thickly.
