

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FROM THE CAPTAIN'S CABIN

I thought that I would take a trip back in recent history. In May 2020 we were able to escape home confinement and engage in recreation activities within 50 km of home. At present we seem to be living as we were in 2019. But yesterday there was a reported 303,643 new cases of COVID worldwide. With winter and the Flu season fast approaching, we should be mindful of the practices that kept COVID and the Flu at low numbers.

The Association has received an update on the flood repair work at the BoatShed. Work is due to start mid June and be completed by the end of July. Our Licence Agreement with the Brisbane City Council is due for renewal. The Association has been granted rent relief for a three month period. We will approach the Council to have an extension on that relief to cover the period that the complex has not been usable.

The Bunnings Newstead Sausage Sizzle that the Association conducted on Easter Sunday was a great success. Over \$1100 was added to the Association's bank balance. I would like to thank the merry Members who helpwd on Easter Sunday. I expect that we will do one more Sausage Sizzle this year.

Over the last couple of months, the Association has been offered various items from 7 metre yachts to moulds for building canoes. We are not in a position to accept large vessels, but will pass details onto our Members. These will be published in the Log.

Our collection of moulds is increasing. We have limited storage above the Workshop. This will limit the size of the moulds unless it can be dis-assembled for storage. The moulds will be available to assist Members in building the boat applicable to that particular mould. This will save a considerable amount of time in the building of that boat. However, it still remains the Members responsibility to obtain a set of plans

and pay the applicable royalty to the designer.

NEW MEMBERS

ANDREW BARTHOLOMEW of Mullumbimbi has "Vakalele" – a 8.8m designed by Newick and built 2019 by Custom Boat Builders by Red cedar with epoxy over. Sail area is 38sqm but also has a 6hp outboard if the wind fails. With a draft of .5m she is suitable for shoal waters as well as an ocean-going capacity. It folds up to be transported on a 2m wide trailer

Not a launching. (A relaunching)

Some members have met my oldest grandson, Zach, he has accompanied me on several Messabouts. Lately Zach has been striking out on his own, he has now completed all three stages of the "Tackers" program run by Yachting Australia through our local Maroochy Sailing Club. The junior sailing program uses Optimists and Pacers, both constructed of, "the other stuff".

Zach's mother, Hannah*, also used to sail at Maroochy and we have had her old wooden Sabot in storage under our house for close on 25 years. The Sabot wasn't going to be "raceable" but we thought it might make a good practice/fun boat for Zach and his younger brother, Connor.

After removal from storage, the prospect of a recommissioning looked pretty favourable. Some

minor seam repairs, replacement of tired fittings and running rigging, then an overall refinishing looked to be all that would be needed. The only snag in the plan turned out to be the replacement of the very brittle plastic towing ring. The original builder, (not me), had obviously employed a Leprechaun to install the nuts on the backing plate inside the forward buoyancy tank. The only way I could reach them was to cut an extra hole in the bulkhead. The subsequent installation of an inspection hatch over the new hole looks like it was always there.

While replacing the running rigging, the staff at Whitworths, (who incidentally are very generous supporters of the Tackers program), suggested that the use of 6mm spectra was perhaps a bit of an overkill for the boom vang on a Sabot, but it was the only rope that they had in the colour that the boys liked. So, of course, Granddad bought it for them.

The Sabot doesn't have a lot of brightwork; the gunwales, thwart, rudder blade, and daggerboard. It seemed like a great opportunity to try out a small can of varnish, generously supplied by one of our guest speakers (Norglass), some time ago. It turned out beautifully.

Then there's the paint.

The colour is called "Electricty". That's what happens when an eight year old is free to choose his own colour. Oh well, the boys love it, and it does have excellent "Hi-Vis" properties.

Zach was out of his skin with excitement when we relaunched. I wasn't able to get many good photos because within minutes Connor and I couldn't keep up in my rowing dinghy (the safety boat). The best I could do was try to catch a quick picture as he shot past us, or zoom-in from a distance. Connor is very keen to go out with Zach when he has had some more practice.

The restoration has been a fun project for the boys and for me, and it's now great to see the old Sabot sailing once again. We haven't been brave enough to attempt a renaming, so for now "White Rose" is all set for a new generation.

The proposed Anzac weekend camp cruise was clear to go. Four participants and boats had nominated interest. Because it was a long weekend, three of the fleet elected to launch on the Friday, meet and decide where to anchor overnight. Dalpura Bay was the anchorage chosen due to wind direction and strength. We were onsite early afternoon, roughly at high tide, consequently, socializing time was limited, with moving anchors on falling tide, we were anchored for the night about five pm.

The three boats and masters were "First Hope" Tom.M, "Mermaid" Alex.M and "Playstation Too" Phil.B.

Saturday morning was pleasant where we were, we were able to go ashore, stretch our legs, make use of amenities, move back to anchor and await our expedition leader Dennis.S. onboard "Y Not Wood".

Dennis went to the beach to effect a small remedy to rigging. As he had launched at Redland Bay and made good time to Macleay Is. Dennis didn't a get chance for a break, and we were away. The plan was to sail down the Caniapa Passage, very scenic I was informed, and looking forward to my first trip down there.



As we rounded the northern part of Macleay we were into a stiff southerly and sails were lowered and motors engaged. Progress was happening, quite slowly, so after a while, Dennis relayed a message to the three of us in turn about finding a place for a break and discuss the plan. The two lead boats continued south, being not familiar with the area, I suggested an area off to port, all mud, no access. Wind and tide was making voyage most uncomfortable,

Eventually we turned back, pulled into Karragarra Is. and decide to abort the journey. Dennis went to Redland Bay to retrieve the boat and I decided to have another night at Dalpura, to pull boat out at Victoria Point next morning. Tom and Alex elected for another night at Dalpura as well.

What I did see of the Caniapa Passage makes me wish to see it, and enjoy it, under much more favourable weather conditions.

AMINE BLUSH A note from Glenn L Designs

What is it?

Most epoxies used in boatbuilding have "amine"-based hardeners. After the epoxy is cured there will usually be a noticeable oily residue on the surface called amine

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blush. The amount of amine blush can vary considerably, from almost unnoticeable to very oily.

This difference is the result of differences in temperature and humidity. The amine blush can affect the bond of subsequent coats of epoxy or paints and should be removed. Although a variety of solvents have been used to remove amine blush, in the shop we use denatured alcohol (shellac thinner), lacquer thinner or acetone. Amine blush can be sanded off, but will require a lot of sandpaper as the paper tends to clog quickly.

Ian Primrose and I have been working at the BoatShed most Thursdays. Other than replacing the castors on the engine crane, most of what we were intending to do is finished.

With forecasts of rain over the next week, we have been keeping watch on the levels in Breakfast Creek. I do not expect any likelihood flooding unless the rain is more intense over a couple of days that rainfall we had at the end of February. The high tides at present are lower than those in February and the rainfall is forecast to be less.

Last Saturday, Jon Elcock and I took delivery of a second-hand Jet BD-920W 9 x 20-inch Belt Drive Bench Lathe and stand. The lathe was kindly donated to the Association by the Wynnum Manly and District Mens Shed. We thank the Mens Shed for the donation. A Note from IAN KIRK CAMP CRUISING ON THE BAY

Hi folks. I had a call this morning from Ben Blackwell from DES in regard to my email. He confirmed that Blaksleys will be a camp ground shared between NP's and QYAC and that a booking will be made through the NP&WL's website. They're hoping the camp ground will be open by September.

It will initially be NP's(QYAC is to be a separate portion of the site for their use only.) but that it could transfer to Minjerribah Camping (QYAC.) in the future. This would make it much more expensive.

Bollards will be installed, no site numbers, and that it will be first in first served.

There will be fire rings/bring your own wood and some signage re regulation.

Where they've backed off from what they advised Jono (Blue Peter) is in regard to the toilet facility, it's size, location, funding and timeline. He had been told it would be installed by September.

Like they've done with the ocean beach on Straddie and at Teewah etc, they'll be 'encouraging' campers to take their own portaloos.

I advised Ben that would be extremely challenging for someone in a boat the size of Pug and impossible for a kayaker. He understood that; more lobbying needed on that point.

Ben also pointed out that Covid had created a shift in user visitation with more locals camping locally. Exactly what I'd told them would be happening now and in the future. We also discussed the benefits to the users' wellbeing, particularly the youth on the Blue Peter expedition cruises.

So, it's now confirmed that Blaksleys is happening. I see this as a major benefit to WBAQ and Blue Peter as well as the wider community.

In our case, I see the opportunity for Blaksleys to be used as a base for local camp ashore cruises. One can then day sail to Peel, Dunwich, The One Mile, Canaipa, around Coochie and over here to Macleay Island. Affordable camping, good waters and very few Riviearas to cope with.

Also only a short distance to travel from Victoria Point, Redland Bay or Cleveland in the loaded boat and with the possibility of reassuring company for the trip over .

I thought I should pass this on in case Ian P wishes to include something in The Log.

PLANS - FREE TO A GOOD HOME - PLANS FOR A VERY SAUCY MINI TUGBOAT



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
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
