

Sadly I missed both due to the flu and organising the Action Day. Ian and I have also been busy "sorting out" the WorkShop.

The VW Action Day was a success with the coffers for the WorkShop getting a top up. These exercises help fund our running costs, overheads and social functions. If the VW Club is happy with our service, we may get the gig again next year.

The Workshop has a vacant space for a Member or a group of Members to build/restore another project. There is a free Lazy E on offer to a financial Member. This would make a great project for a Member to take on. In the end, you would finish with a classic Jack Holt design 16' dinghy. I am sure you would have plenty of assistance from other Members willing to lend a hand or advice.

The BCC has installed a dedicated switchboard in our WorkShop. Before, if we popped a circuit breaker, we had to contact the Te Waka Club to come and open their storeroom to access the switchboard and reset the circuit breaker. The new board is now located on the Southern wall adjacent to the fridge.

I had an interesting exercise just after Father's Day. Standard gift from my Daughters is a Gift Card from Bunnings. As my Ryobi battery packs for my battery operated tools are over 10 years old, not only do they have a small capacity, they are starting to lose capacity. I decided to buy some larger capacity. With eight different combinations of capacity and batteries

Saturday 19th August 2023

A sunny sky, some little clouds and a northwest breeze was all it took for the early bird to get underway from the public ramp at Boreen Point. Alex Malcolm launched the *Explorer* at 1300 on Saturday 19th and sailed across to Teewah Landing arriving at 1500 hours. This time there was no difficulty in finding the entrance by having the map with the coordinates in one hand, the Garmin ETREX 10 GPS in another hand, the tiller also in another hand and the last hand was on the main sheet. Easy!

The self-inflating air mattress was laid out on the floorboards topped with a sleeping bag and Mermaid's boom tent set up. Absolutely spacious compared to the Mermaid. A siesta was beckoning but a strong will took the skipper for a walk before dinner. Being tied up to the jetty and sheltered amongst the reeds and mangroves meant there was no rock'n'roll, very peaceful.

7.25 nautical miles made.



Sunday 20th August 2023

In the morning the Explorer was paddled out from its haven and sail set for Dunns Beach adjacent to the Boreen Point Caravan Park. After anchoring, lowering the gaff sail into the lazy jacks and putting on the sail ties Alex waded ashore and walked to the ramp to get the campervan and trailer. Breakfast was had overlooking *Pug*, lan and Robbie Kirk's Pic-cup Pram bobbling about its mooring.





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After checking in, setting up, eating lunch and indulging in a siesta another venture out into the lake was enjoyed in the company of Sue and Ken Mills in their Tirrik. The wind was around 9 knots so a reef was employed. No weather helm and delightful handling. Experimentation in seating positions proved interesting. When sitting on the stern sheets the bow was high and stern down. Sitting on the floor boards improved trim greatly and the coaming provided a backrest while the long pool cushion completed the "sooky la la "miles made experience. 10.17 nautical."

Monday 21st August

A pattern of weather emerged with light winds in the morning and stronger winds in the afternoon. So, no reef in the morning (a thing of beauty is a Bolger designed Spur II rowing skiff powered by a graceful stroker, out-pacing a mere sailing boat) and reef No.1 in the afternoon. The boat speed with an 8 to 10 knot wind was around 4.5 knots. This day Explorer practiced lying to by pointing up to the wind a bit, letting out the main and holding the tiller away, worked well and the boat sat there with little drift or forwards motion. **7.2 nautical miles made good.**

Tuesday 22nd August 2023

Sunshine and sailing make a sailor smile. Another day with the same recipe as previous days. Sail before morning coffee at 1000 hours (some person is very set in their ways) and another sail before lunch, look mum, no reef.

Wave, a new WBAQ member signed on *Explorer* as crew and made the trim excellent and performance good. **Sail ho!** came the cry from the foredeck as *Kathleen* hove into sight. Do two Bobcats make a flotilla? How many make a fleet? Dick Reynolds demonstrated his prowess by not reefing. Both

catboats skimmed across the water in tandem, no advantage to either.



By now more members and boats arrived, 17 in total at anchor off the beach. A wonderful sight.

Wednesday 23rd August 2023

Joy to the water. A voyage of all boats was made to Mill Point, just along from Elanda Point for lunch onshore. The colorful array of craft dappled the lake while they rode the wavelets pointing their bows to the breeze.

On the *Explorer*, Wave (returning crew) was promoted to coxswain and helmed the outward journey while the skipper swanned about on the foredeck. A reef was put in for the return trip as did Cousin Tom Malcolm in his Shearwater. The sail back was quick.



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Later the Explorer sailed again with No.2 reef in 16 to 18 knot winds. Still steamed ahead. **Note:** full main on the Bobcat is 110 square feet, No.1 Reef reduces the sail area to about 80 square feet and Reef No.2 to 52 square feet. The sails were made by Switch Sails. In the evening many members dined at the Apollonian Hotel in Boreen Point enjoying the fellowship and company. **7,6** nautical miles made good.



Thursday 24th August 2023

Look at that weather. Gone to the dogs. Blowing 18 to 20 knots, gusting to 26 knots. Only one brave little boat scuttled out on the water quickly gaining the sheltered shore and down the Noosa river to Tewantin It is suspected that a barbeque burner was used.

Copious amounts of tea drunk, discussions on merits of boat designs, sculling and oars, chatting to the other woodies occupied the day..

Friday 25th August 2023

Rumors abounded of a threatening storm, inducing sailors to pull their boats out and depart, as did the *Explorer* and her skipper. But, not before a dawn sailing for two hours in a lovely breeze around the lower section of the lake. Phil Brown and Rick O'Donell kindly pulled boats out at the caravan sand ramp, saving them the trudge and sail to the public ramp. **4,36 nautical miles made.**

Rick became a Capt Thunderbolt award Nominee when he omitted to drop his mast and drove the length of the campsite without mishap until he reached his site where a tree got in the way. Whack! No damage thanks to strong mast.

The storm did not prevail, the grey morning sky cleared and a favorable breeze of about 5 Knot+ arrived by the time I arrived to hoist sail.

John Walduck had just come in from a sail, probably for morning tea. "Pussyfoot" and I headed out in the general direction for Teewah, and noticed "FOMO" and skipper were coming out also. I kept an eye on the other boat and thought there may have been an issue with rigging or hardware, however the Skipper finally boarded and sailed out. I had nearly sailed back by then, to find that rocks were an issue on trying to exit the anchorage.

Darrell headed down toward the exit from Cootharaba trying to locate a creek, I returned toward the North. We two finally met up and returned to shore for a lunch break.

Later *FOMO* and *Pussyfoot* were out playing again in a slightly stronger, but consistent breeze. We headed to windward for some time before going about and the run back to Boreen Pt campground was a straight line at a pace mostly about 4.5 Knots.

A great sailing day.

The influx of boats for the All Boat Regatta being held on the weekend by the local Sailing Club had already started.



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

Some arrived at the start of the week but others came later. The length of stays varied.

That is the advantage of a week-long Messabout. Your stay can be tailored around the rest of your life. David Guy came from Gympie and John Walduck came down from Kingaroy, others just came from Brisbane a little more than an hour away. Overall, about a dozen boats attended at one time or another.

Apart from the odd storm and a big blow on Friday night, the weather was terrific. The camp area is very nice with ample space between campsites. Even with the inflow of "weekenders" on Friday afternoon there was no great imposition. A great week, or part thereof as the case may be.

My take - Phil Brown

I arrived at Captain Logan camp area on Wednesday and set up my accommodation. The process of doing so took longer than expected as the tent site was 50 or more metres from the car park and I had several walks, mainly because of excess baggage. Fortunately the journey was only uphill one way.

According to the earlier arrivals there had been a storm the previous afternoon, so I elected to leave Playstation Too on the trailer for next morning launch.

The proposed programme for **Thursday** was 9.00am on water taking smoko and lunch, with Billies Bay as our destination.

Lakes/Dams can challenge sailors, and the day was an easy challenge due to a general lack of wind. We

watched intently for ripples on the surface anticipating some change of direction.

I think even the Dinghy Sailors had coffee on board and possibly could have boiled the billy. We did manage to make land and owing to the hour we combined morning tea and lunch.

The return trip was slightly more exciting, as there was some breeze to sail off, About half of the boats followed along the shoreline while the rest thought going further out may have an advantage. Sailing on, it appeared the shoreline travellers had the right idea as they made steady progress heading toward camp, while the outward bound group enjoyed more speed, but not toward camp.

When the speedsters tacked toward camp the breeze was still acceptable and were able to gain on the shore group, but had a lot of way to make up.

Abbreviating a little, the outer group had variable wind, but a little better than others and it seemed we could not catch up.

Mother Nature is marvellous and decided to even thing out, the shore group were becalmed, and the outer mob kept moving albeit with fluky wind.

The outcome was the fleet returned in total, fairly close together. The 'Gong' going to Ken and Sue from Cootharaba, who led the fleet from the start. A certain member in a Pooduck Skiff tried desperately for line-honours but the Wyllie crew of "Saxon" triumphed.



Friday looked as it would be similar and it was thought wiser to explore Logan's Inlet, closest to the camp, to be easier for those who were leaving, or retrieving boats to trailer after sail.



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Yet again the breeze seemed to be enough for some of us to try to circumnavigate Pelican Island. The mission was aborted, due again to lack of consistent breeze. We headed back toward camp and a couple of us elected to go past into Logan's Inlet, sailing on to meet up with the others heading back to the boat ramp. That was a nice short sail with a number of tacks.

Saturday. Five boats remained and we elected to try to reach Hamon Cove via Pelican Island. There is some 'skinny' water east of Pelican Island and most of us touched the centreboard on the bottom.

The wind again was fluky and we did not reach our planned destination, finding a place to land for lunch before the run to camp.

The days sail was the most consistent breezes I had and was most enjoyable. Three of us retrieved our boats from the water, leaving only two of our group to sail the following day.

John W and Lady Jane sailed to Hayes Inlet, and again the wind departed, giving him a slow journey back to the boat ramp.





There were V-Dubs to the left of us and V-dubs to the right of us. More V-Dubs than you could poke a stick at! Kombies, traditional ones, buggies and those other ones. Some that made more noise than their size entitled them to do.

We were invited to feed the masses with sausages, onions in a slab of bread – the re-enactment of the proverbial Bunnings Sausage Sizzle that we do so well.

WOODEN BOAT ASSN QLD Early Memories Ivan Holm

will put down a few recollections here as a basis for further research perhaps calling on others who may have more detailed memories.

I think I joined the Association in !992/93 not long after somewhat impulsively saving an abandoned International 5.5metre keelboat built for the 1968 Olympic trials.

I don't know when the Association was formed but it had been going for some years when I joined. At the time meetings were held at the Queensland Maritime Museum (QMM) but I believe some early meetings were held in member's houses and sometimes on a boat at Manly or on the Brisbane River. I'm not sure whether this was Mac Finch's or not.

I believe that the formation of the Association was primarily attributed to Bill Ewing (who passed on quite a few years ago). Bill was the epitome of the cranky, opinionated, frugal Scotsman. I believe he had been the master of the dredge that chewed all of the coral from around Mud Island.

Bill had an old 30 square metre called "Typhoon". In the early years Bill was very much 'captain of the ship' and the long suffering secretary was John Morrison. John I believe was a pharmacist at PA hospital.

There was some difference of opinion between Bill and the director of the Maritime Museum Association -I believe he was Dr Bill MacLeod another opinionated Scotsman, resulting in meetings being moved to the Brisbane Sailing Squadron (BSS) at Bulimba only a matter of months after I joined. This was a bit of a cold unfriendly space but worked OK.

There was not much by way of organised events that I can recall. I remember having a family day at BSS with quite a few small boats involved.

When Bill decided to hand over the reigns, Rob Denny became president. Rob was a talented sailor and marketed "System Three" Epoxy. After Rob, I took over as president for a couple of years. Life was pretty busy at that time with young children and a very busy private psychiatric practice and I'm sure I didn't give my role as president the time it deserved.

Relationships with the maritime museum improved when a couple of WBAQ members joined the museum organisation. WBAQ members were involved in projects at the museum workshop including the restoration of a beautiful Flying Dutchman and a 16ft skiff called "Fury". I fondly remember having our Christmas parties at Roy Bliss's wonderful old boat shed on the river at Bulimba.

With my increasing interest in classic yacht sailing, especially after I took over the custodianship of "Laurabada", I sailed off in different directions and didn't have a lot of contact with the WBAQ again until the last couple of years.

I hope there are other long standing members who may be able to add a lot more to my scribblings.




