With fifteen boats on display, there was a lot of looking, touching and talking. Over sixty model dinghies were built by youngsters under the watchful eyes of our Members.. All of Ian Primrose's tug boats sold along with most of his other toys.

Thanks to Phil Brown for the excellent organising of our attendance. Thanks also to the Members who had their boats on display, who supervised the building of the kits and who made the toys.

The Office of Fair Trading has decided that Associations, like the WBAQ, require a Grievance Procedure to be added to the Association's Constitution. This Procedure will set out a procedure for dealing with a dispute under the rules between parties as mentioned in section 47A(1) of the Act. An additional smaller change is that at an AGM, the

Association's Financial Statement shall report the total benefits and remuneration made to Management Committee Members and their relatives even if the amount to report is zero. The additions have been approved by the Committee and will be presented as a Special Resolution at the June Meeting of the Members.

Work on the Lazy E has been on hold for the last couple of months while we concentrated on laser cutting of kits and cutting, sanding and painting toys for the Expo. I would like to restart on the repair next month. Ideally I would like to see two teams, one on Thursday and one on Saturday. Saturday would be to allow Members who work during the week to participate in the repair. If you can help, please let me know.

In October 2019 we visited Pimpama River on a paddle, row, motor messabout, launching downstream side of Kerkin Rd Weir. I was one of the four participants on that Messabout.



Four and a half years later we revisit the Kerkin Road weir to venture upstream, as it turns out three of the participant this time were on the last journey. We felt a little unsure if we were at the correct location as there is now a large high level bridge spanning the river adjacent to the low level weir crossing.

Maybe we should get out more often.

We paddled/rowed upstream, and of course, still water because of weir, the water close to the weir was dark



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brown due to recent rainfall upstream. I think the weir would have been spilling earlier in the week.



Not far from the weir the water was much cleaner. The river is reasonably wide and the view from the driver seat is pleasant. We found a dismounting spot for morning tea.

Refreshments done, off again, we discussed the reason for the weir and came to the conclusion it was to maintain the water table level suitable to the growing of Sugar Cane. This was evidenced by manmade channels off through the fields.

After some time the river started to narrow and had more fallen trees, I felt some rubbing under the kayak of soft twiggy branches. Darrell, now under steam (read electric motor) struck a couple of submerged objects and elected to turn back.

Dennis and I paddled on, not far, and the river narrowed further, and a stone throw (with a weak arm) further was a tree across the banks. The lead canoe could fit under the log but, alas, the Captain could not. I did not bother to try. There was a second log, broken, and Dennis surmised it may have been a place where the local cane rail may have been.

We turned to retrace the stream and on contacting Darrell, found that all was good, so we stopped for a lunch break before returning to the launch point.

All in all a good paddle, not a large distance, about 14.5 klm.

This was our sixth showing at the Maleny Wood Expo, the first being in 2016 but missing 3 in the Covid years.

It was "bump-in" (as they say in the trade) on Friday 2nd and the boats started to arrive and so had the rain the night before, resulting on mud, mud and more mud. It was not looking too good with the organisers looking at a loss through poor attendance.

However, they are a hardy lot in the village and surrounds at Maleny and they weren't deterred so at 8.30 they were queuing up sheltering under umbrellas waiting to get in. It was showery all day – not too annoying or uncomfortable.





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We had a great display of 18 boats and canoes and we were provided with a large marquee to shelter, sell stuff and to construct the model kits with kids.



There was a lot of interest in the boats on display as there was great variety from canoes, John Tennock's stacking dinghy (called Curlew), Scott's beautiful but powerful putt-putt "Lillian Rose", a great range of sail boats as well as Graeme's huge Murray River Boat in which he camped most comfortably.



Saturday night 18 went to the Maleny Pub for dinner and that was as pleasant social occasion.

The sun came out on Sunday and stayed out for Monday as did the crowd.

We ran model building workshops 3 times on each day, each with 8 or 9 participants. The kits went together well, thanks to Jim who was assisted in their production by Jon. Together they produced one hundred laser-cut kits.

We restricted the kit participation age to >8 years as younger kids just don't seem to have the dexterity.

Some younger ones snuck in so their fathers had to do the build and some proved as incompetent as their young kids.

For the younger kids we had "Tommy the Tugboat" kits consisting of just 4 pieces and we sold 48 of these at \$5 each.

The skill level varied, but it is very rewarding to see the pride on kid's faces when they walk out with a boat they have just completed.

The proceeds of the larger kits went to the organisers raising about \$900 and we raised \$720 from sale of models and kits with proceeds for us. It's really not about the money – the pleasure is seeing kids walk away with a cheap, basic, battery-less toy and a smile on their face.





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Thanks to Phil Brown who did all the liaison and organising and to members who bought boats and assisted in the tutoring of the kids. It was an enjoyable and successful show!

Phil Brown Adds...

The Wooden Boat Association of Queensland participated in the above event over the May long weekend (4th-6th)

We had a static display of some of our member's boats and canoes / kayaks. Unfortunately for the organisers the weather prior to the event was wet, and decided to present again on the Saturday. The morning crowd was good, but as the showers came over it seemed to be enough to discourage attendance.

The event is Family-oriented and has a variety of activities for children and adults. The activities for the youngsters include assembling a timber plat pot holder, painting spinning tops, wood art using a soldering iron, a three legged milking stool, a carry box, and others.

We ran 9 workshops over the three days and had 61 model Dinghy kits completed and taken away by youngsters 8-14 years old. The Kits are laser-cut and assembled as we would a stitch and glue full size dinghy.

We had eight youths per session with one adviser for each person. The usual time to completion is about one hour, but the older, more competent children can complete the task in 40-45 minutes. Some kit builders

have never used cable ties or hot glue guns before this, so it can be a big learning curve, and a great boost to their ego when the boat is finished.

This year Ian Primrose designed and made a 'Tommy the Tugboat' (+Jim laser-cut anchors and signs) that was assembled from four pieces of wood and two dowels. These tugboats could be assembled by younger siblings for the other build class, or any other youngster. We also had other small wooden toys' sail boats, cars with boat trailers, racing cars etc, that were popular items for sale.



The Expo is run by the Barung Land Care group of the Maleny area as a fund-raising event, we let their people collect the money at the Information tent, and your committee decided to donate these proceeds to their cause. We hope that some time down the track some of these kids will recall the experience and build a canoe or boat for themselves.

Now it is time to give a **BIG SHOUT OUT OF THANKS** to all of the members and their partners who allowed them time off to help, or came along and helped, and also towed their boats to display and 'wave the flag' for our association.



The Sydney RAID group Myall Lakes RAID 2024

This year's RAID at Mall Lakes had a very good turnout of about 20 boats, up from last year's event where 8 boats took part. If you have ever thought about attending one of these informal gatherings I encourage you to make the effort. It is a very enjoyable way to spend a few days.





This was my first time joining this, or any, group of sailing/camping cruisers as well as my first time on Myall Lakes. It was well worth the 6 hr. Drive to get to the Violet Hill boat ramp, situated in the Mall Lakes National Park. The ramp is quite good and the park has a toilet block.

Boats and their sailors hailed from as far away as Paynesville, Gippsland in the South, to Redland Bay in the North and included such places as Canberra, Port Hacking, Sydney, Shoalhaven, Foster, Coffs Harbour and myself from Terranora.

Some of the boats attending were: A Norwalk Island Sharpie, an Oughtred Wee Seal & Fulmar, a Storer sailing canoe with outriggers, a Goat Island Skiff, a Welsford Navigator, a Bolger Martha Jane & Bobcat, a West White Potter, a Botteril 16 Explorer, a Core Sound 17, a 125, a Sunmaid 20, a Stornaway 18, a Pocketship, a Cygnet 20, and an O'Day 17.

The Mall Lakes system offers great sailing including the large, mostly fresh and clear waters of Myall Lake, then through the narrow channel into Boolambayte Lake which itself turns into a narrow channel into the Bombah Broadwater.

This RAID stayed in the Mall Lake and into Boolambayte lake only, however.

I turned off the M1 as the last light of the day faded, driving along the rough Lakes Way and turning onto the gravel Violet Hill Rd. After dodging potholes I rolled into the campground and pulled up to a spot not far from an interesting double ender sitting on her trailer under a canopy of stars and strongly scented eucalyptus air.

Monday morning dawned clear where numerous blokes came to welcome and enquire about the boat, myself and where we were from. There I learned that some of the RAIDers had camped elsewhere for the night and were returning to meet up and get underway by 9:30 am.



After launching I motored a short distance away to anchor while I filled my water ballast tanks and just as this task was being completed the fleet sailed past with waves and hellos. Underway, I followed them through the flukey narrows in a largely following light breeze.

As we rounded the point to Tickerabit the wind got up to about 10 kn as we anchored and explored the site which offered a sandy bottom, good holding ground and clear water. Fourteen boats then set off towards the top of Mall Lake in about 12 kn. to Kataway Bay for lunch. There was not much of a landing spot so we anchored, ate and talked across the water.



All were underway by 2:30 for a delightful sail beginning with a run, then reach to a beat in diminishing winds through the narrows to Johnson's Beach campground on Boolambayte Lake for the night. As the sun set, firewood was brought out from various holds and lit to enjoy conversation and company.





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Tuesday morning dawned sunny again with the wind increasing a bit making the beat to Korsmans campground very interesting. Once underway with a reef in the main in increasing winds we were on the beat again. Winds increased to 15-20 kn. Making the sailing more challenging, and to me, fun!

We beat through the Violet Hill narrows, some boats opting to stay put at the campground due to the forecast. A SSW storm approaching with winds of 40 kn gusts expected as well as rain. Seven of us opted to carry on to Tickerabit to wait it out in the lee.



The wait took all the next day and night! Thursday was the day I expected to return home, as three of our fleet did, but decided to stay as I was concerned about retrieving the boat onto the trailer with the strong winds still present blowing onshore to the ramp. The best solution, of course, to a pickle like this is to put in a reef and go sailing!

So that's what the four of us did. We sailed up the western side of Myall Lake to the head of Mayers Bay in increasing winds. Two decided to return to Tickerabit for the day while I and one other reached across the top of the Lake with winds gusting up to 20 k.

This made the beat into Cutaway Bay very exciting as I was somewhat over canvassed. I anchored there for lunch and then put in my second reef. This allowed for a wonderful beat in 20-25 kn back to Tickerabit for the night.

Friday morning dawned clear again with a light wind, enough to sail with the reefs shaken out to Violet Hill where willing hands assisted with each other haul out.

It was a fabulous few days, without question and there was some talk about holding a RAID event on Moreton

Bay sometime, as well as one in the Gippsland Lakes which also sounded like an interesting place to sail.

All being well, by the time this edition of the LOG comes out there might be a video about the RAID Myall Lakes 2024 on the YouTube channel "Sailing Kate Louise". Take a look!

On the Brisbane River, we launched at Colmslie and proceeding upriver with the tail of the flooding tide. There may have been an error in promoting this outing, but was posted on the Webpage Calendar, where Mark, a fellow member, saw the notice and messaged to say he would attend.

Mark and I had met at the Victoria Point boat ramp awhile back, he then had a Puffin dinghy and timber catamaran moored off shore.

On this day he arrived with a new boat, only on it's third outing, the second outing being only two days prior, on Anzac Day. (See Launchings Above)

The boat "Matilda" is a Vivier Aber 4.3 metre Strip Planked Sailing Dinghy, which Mark built.





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We set off with a gentle breeze which also turned to be fickle, so a bit of sailing and a bit of drifting with tide, and so on and so forth.

After about an hour and a half we reached the Hawthorne Ferry pier and elected to go to the opposite side of the river where there is a docking area and space for us to tie up, stretch our legs and to have morning tea.

We decided to re trace our movements and, as the breeze had appeared to have freshened, we thought we may have enjoyed a good run. We did so to the first bend, where I reckoned a good reach might occur, but alas, no. So an exercise in tacking was in order for the return to the ramp.

The Aber has a boomless sail, and Mark set out with a reef in, and I am pleased he did, as he had to do some circle work and heaving to, so I could catch up. I think the Aber has a sail area of 104 sq ft, and has a slippery hull, The Catspaw has 64 sq ft of sail. Not so quick!

We both enjoyed the messabout, plenty to look at each side of the River, the City Cats were very courteous toward us, and there was not a large amount of other boating activity on this section of the River.

Total distance sailed about 14.8 klm.

Gail Halliwell writes...

"Many current and past members of the Wooden Boat Association of Queensland will remember Don Halliwell. Don participated in many WBAQ events such as the Messabouts.

Some will know that he designed and built wooden boats (about 26), many inspired by the work of boat designer Philip Bolger. He sailed these boats in Moreton Bay and as far north as the Great Sandy Straits. Early boats such as Kim's Pram sailed around Thursday Island and the Torres Strait when our family were there.

Don is now 88 years old and has vascular dementia.

So Don and I are moving to Canberra to live in an apartment, currently under construction, attached to our daughter's house. We expect the build will be ready for us to move to Canberra in 2025.

Now, we are starting the process of dismantling some fifty years of boat building under our house in Bardon - sad but necessary."

Footnote: Don has a Bolger "Birdwatcher" as an almost finished project that may come onto the market soon.

WHAT HAPPENNED AT THE LAST MEETING

We did a small wood-working job for Steve, a member of the Te waka Dragon Boats. Being a retired butcher, Steve kindly made some Italian Sausages to supplement our BBQ meal. Mmm ...delicious.

Our Guest speaker, Alan Graham started the Traditional & Vintage Boat Association of Queensland in 1988 that later, in February 1991, it became the Wooden Boat Association of Qld.

Alan started the Bribie Classic Regatta that is now in its 25th year.

At the risk of challenge, I call Alan "the father of small wooden boating in Qld". Not only has he built numerous timber boats, he has generously shared his



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knowledge and advice to others. He has promoted small wooden boats at every opportunity by not only example but through active participation in events. This his story...

Alan served his 5 year apprenticeship in boat-building from 1953 to 1959 at Geoff Clark's three-ramp slipway at Hawthorne. It was the time where the apprentice copped all the jobs that others disliked such as clearing the mud from the slipway and keeping the fire going under the steambox. Red-lead was the material of choice and this often found its way onto one's lunch!

He stayed on for another year but he could see the march of "progress" with fibreglass replacing timber and outboards replacing inboard motors. It was time to move on.

For a change of pace, Alan became a set-maker for the ABC TV (Ch 2) making scenery. This he did for about 6 years. Time to go back to the familiar trade of boat building.

Start a business – Why not? He could sell every boat that he made and he made plenty – all wood of course. There were ski boats, a 21ft Hartley and numerous small boats – his own designs, made in a jig – the production line way.

He was approached by Haines Hunter to make the plugs for their production boats. This proved more beneficial to HH than Alan.

It was the early '70's and time to move on so Alan took on work with another builder, this time getting more credit for his design and innovation. Alas it was not to last as the 1974 floods put 20feet of water through the workshop, destroying the plugs he had made and the employer went bust.

Disillusion prevailed as there was not possibility of

Disillusion prevailed as there was not possibility of picking up the pieces so Alan became a Transport Inspector until he took early retirement at 58. Time to build more boats.

He completed "Classic" in 1986— a ply clinker puttputt with a 5 HP Blaxland. It was displayed a Expo88, being only one of two boats exhibited. He build two Catspaw dinghies- one called Ella in 1991 with a small Blaxland that he still has.

Alan makes a scale model of each boat he builds or sometimes a half-model to adjust the lines.

He still has a few boats under the house but at 85, he is now having trouble getting in and out of them these days so his boating is limited.

The Bribie Classic Regatta that Alan kicked off in 1997 with 40 boats now attracts close to 100. With a few deviations, Alan has spent a lifetime in wooden boats. You have to admire his passion.

Moreton Bay Classic Boat Regatta June 22nd

For past two years there has been a very successful boat regatta, primarily large boats sailing from Manly to Peel Island. (Horseshoe Bay). Around 70 large boats leaving around 8.30am with at a guess 150 or so people. The organisers would love to have lots of small boats, along the lines of Bribie, on the beach. You can sail in from anywhere aiming to be there midmorning.



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They have invited the WBAQ to attend. Also like Bribie a trophy "people's choice" and other generous prizes are being offered. Ian Eastgate is making the trophy. The "people's choice" will only be for the shore boats not those anchored off. A free BBQ lunch is also on offer.
